Ten Things That Require Zero Talent

1. Being on time.

Early is on time. On time is late. Late is unacceptable.

2. Work ethic.

Are you reliable? Do you contribute to the process? Do you always do your 'artistic homework?' Do you value being a good colleague, being thorough and not selling yourself short?

3. Effort.

How hard you willing to work and what are you willing to do to achieve your goals? Are you a team player?

4. Body language.

What does your body language, posture, facial expression say about you? Is it positive? Engaging? Respectful of the fact that your body is your instrument?

5. Energy.

Everyone has energy to devote to a goal, and the decision of how much to give. Be conscious about where yours goes.

6. Attitude.

A great attitude maximizes the talent that you have and offsets what you lack. Are you going to have a 'pity party' and wallow in self doubt? Beat yourself up and lament that you may not measure up? Or are you going to resolve to turn your weaknesses into strengths? I CAN do it!

7. Passion.

Our passion for what we do spurs curiosity, can carry us through the tough times and become infectious.

8. Being coachable.

Are you open, receptive, willing to try things? If you act like you know it all and don't observe, listen and maintain an open mind, you've probably closed the door on ascending the ladder to the top. Arrogance is not a trait that anyone finds appealing.

9. Doing extra.

Go the extra mile, beyond the minimal requirements. Extra research and preparation fosters confidence. By embracing every opportunity to be thorough, we gain the respect of our peers and colleagues.

10.Being prepared.

Only you can give yourself the time and space to be as ready as you can be. Make it a habit, and you will make the most of your talent. There is great truth in the saying: Failing to prepare is preparing to fail. Showing up to rehearsal without having THOROUGHLY learned your role and being MEMORIZED will get you fired. Not a way to build a good reputation in the business!
